This will build on their understanding of notation, the musical elements, and the ability to analyse music they listen to using key musical terminology. Year 10's will sit a mock exam towards the end of the academic year.  Performance (30% of final mark)  Year 10 students will be learning an instrument of their choice with one-to-one tuition, and will have numerous opportunities to perform in school concerts, lessons, and school events.
